1870 to 1973, About a 100 Years Later ...103 to Be Exact By Otto Klay #CM-0010

August 1973, we, my wife and I, emigrated to the Promised Land from Helvetia Land (Switzerland). Not much money in hand but

with a promise of a job, I remember how nervous the landing in San Francisco was. How must the Pioneers have felt a 100 years earlier?

As a tool and die maker, I found my gold in the Silicon

Of course we had heard of the Wild West when we grew up in Switzerland and of course of *Bonanza* in particular. Names like Virginia City and Carson City, I knew already before I was even able to speak proper English. My Dad loved the gunfights they staged in Virginia City. On the way to Carson City, down to Gold Hill, I remember we toured a silver mine. Little did I know its legacy when we drove past the old mint. I think we didn't even stop in Carson City? That was in 1975.

As a boy in Switzerland, I got introduced to collecting stamps. Once a month we took the train to the next big city to a club meeting, usually on a Saturday. I learned early that quality and rarity were out of my reach. So I collected the "Commons". It was fun!

Sometime in the mid-eighties, *USA Today*, the newspaper was launched. I was impressed and liked the new format, specially the business section. In it, I noticed an ad about coins from a company called Blanchard in New Orleans. That's how I got started in coin collecting.

First I bought everything under the sun. I signed up for a "Program of the Month", where for a certain dollar amount they sent me a variety of different coins. I was too busy raising a family and making money, so my excuse is I didn't "buy the books, before the coins!" But it was a good lesson! My collection grew, but aimlessly; so I subscribed to a coin magazine!

Also on my way home from work, every Friday I started to stop by a local coin shop. The owner was usually sitting behind some kind of a counter and seated on chairs before him were some of his buddies or customers. Due to a career change we moved to Reno and my wife and I retired! What I needed was a new challenge in coin collecting. I joined the Reno Coin Club and signed up for the ANA courses in "Grading, Counterfeit Detection," etc, etc. It was about time!

I heard about Rusty Goe's, new book, *The Mint on Carson Street*. So one day I stopped in and bought the book. What a nice guy, he signed it for me even though he did not know me.

Now I'm on a new mission, collect all 111 "CC"s, or most of them anyway! Sorry Rusty I haven't read you're whole book yet; but I'm getting there! With every coin I buy there are numerous chapters that go with it.

So let me tell you about my *Road to 111*. So far I have completed Rusty's formula for a 10-Piece "CC" type set. In choosing so I stayed with the highest possible grade and rarity I could afford. In the meantime I acquired two more quarter dollars. So now what? Finish off the quarters since only I have six more to go? Focus on a year, like the 1870 inaugural mintage? Actually, I'm still a sucker for the Morgan dollar, I love that coin! Concentrating on that dollar series would be most satisfying, because I would come full circle, adding the "CC" silver dollars one more time to my collection on the *Road to 111*.
